The use of "dust of the earth" in the biblical narrative pertains specifically to the formation of the physical body of the first man but does not capture the full theological implication of being created in God's image. Thus, the chosen answer encapsulates the complete and biblically consistent understanding of how God uniquely created humanity.

It reflects the belief that God's grace is extended to families of believers. In contrast, the other options involve perspectives that either restrict baptism to personal statements of faith or fail to recognize the covenantal relationship that exists within the community of believers, particularly regarding their children. Thus, the understanding that baptism is appropriate for the infants of church members aligns with the theological framework of the Westminster Shorter Catechism.
