Logging tech readings for high drive in the tech and program logs is essential for maintaining an accurate record of a station's performance and ensuring transparency in operations. The tech and program logs are specifically designed for this type of documentation, making them the correct choice for logging tech readings.

It is also consistent with safety protocols that dictate clear and accessible emergency equipment locations to assist in rapid response to emergencies. In contrast, placing a fire extinguisher inside the studio or in the control room could hinder access during emergencies or create additional risks due to proximity to potential fire hazards associated with equipment and materials typically found in those areas. Additionally, the reference to a blue cabinet does not align with standard practices, which prioritize clear visibility and accessibility.

Contest entries might involve public participation where consent is implied, and conducting interviews typically implies that the interviewee is aware their responses will be aired, further compromising their privacy expectations rather than necessitating direct consent for each instance.
