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Explanations

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1. Which substances are considered controlled substances?

Controlled substances are defined by their inclusion in specific regulatory schedules that categorize them based on their accepted medical use, potential for abuse, and safety or dependence risk. For instance, focusing solely on illegal drugs or prescription medications excludes the broader category of controlled substances, which also includes various medications with specific restrictions. Natural herbal supplements are generally not classified as controlled substances unless specifically designated under the relevant schedules.

Therefore, community acknowledgment plays a fundamental role in qualifying someone to provide guidance or testimony regarding child-rearing practices within the tribe.
