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Explanations

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1. In urban geography, which term best describes the outer residential area of a city, often associated with commuter suburbs?

- A. Central business district
- B. Zone of transition
- C. Inner city
- D. Suburbs**

This describes how cities are organized into zones, with the outer residential area where people live and commute into the center being the suburbs. Suburbs are the living areas beyond the inner city, often connected by roads and rail and known for commuter travel to the core for work. The central business district is the city's downtown, focused on offices and shops, not a residential ring. The zone of transition lies between the inner city and suburbs and typically shows mixed land use and housing change, while the inner city refers to the older, densely built core. So the best term for the outer residential commuter area is suburbs.

2. Which type of river load remains dissolved in solution as it is transported?

- A. Saltation
- B. Suspension
- C. Dissolved load**
- D. Bedload

Rivers transport materials in different forms depending on whether the material is dissolved or in solid form. The one that remains dissolved in solution as it is transported is the dissolved load. This consists of minerals that have dissolved into the water as ions, so they move with the flow invisibly and can travel long distances without settling. By contrast, the suspended load is made of very fine solid particles held up in the water, the bedload includes larger particles that roll or slide along the river bed, and saltation describes particles bouncing along the bed. Only the dissolved load stays in solution; the others are physical solids that remain as separate particles or grains. For example, minerals from rock weathering can dissolve and be carried as ions in the water, rather than as visible particles.

3. In a delta, what are the smaller channels that branch away from the main river called?

Distributaries are the smaller channels that branch away from the main river in a delta. When a river enters the sea, its velocity drops and it deposits sediment, causing the flow to split into multiple smaller waterways that spread water and sediment across the delta surface. This network forms the characteristic fan-like pattern of a delta and helps build land. Levees are raised banks along channels formed by flood deposits, not branching waterways. The term load refers to the sediment the river carries, not a channel. A gorge is a deep canyon carved by a river, not part of delta channel networks.

4. Which term refers to the section of the river found closest to the mouth, where the river is widest and flows fastest?

In the downstream progression of a river, the section closest to the sea is the lower course. This part is where the channel has become the widest and the valley broader, shaped by continued lateral erosion and deposition of sediments. The gradient is gentle here, so the river tends to spread out and often slows down, forming wide floodplains as it approaches the mouth. Since the description emphasizes being near the mouth and wide, the lower course is the best fit. The other terms describe different things—the mouth is the opening at the end of the river, the source is where the river begins, and alluvium refers to sediment deposited by the river.

5. Which term means an area of countryside?

- A. Rural**

Rural describes countryside areas with open spaces, farmland, and low population density, serving as a clear opposite to urban areas. The question is asking for a term that means an area of countryside, and rural fits this purpose perfectly because it names the landscape type itself. The other terms are not landscape labels: saltation is a mode of sediment transport where particles hop along a surface; a hydrograph is a graph showing how river discharge changes over time; managed retreat is a coastal management policy allowing land to be reclaimed by the sea. So rural is the best term to denote an area of countryside.

6. The management practice of alternating different crops to maintain soil health and conserve water is called what?

- A. Monoculture

Alternating different crops in the same field over time is crop rotation. This practice keeps soil healthy by balancing nutrient use—different crops take up nutrients in different ways, and including legumes can add nitrogen back into the soil. It also helps break pest and disease life cycles and improves soil structure, which enhances water infiltration and retention, aiding water conservation. Monoculture repeats the same crop and can deplete nutrients and raise pest risk; agroforestry mixes trees with crops; deforestation is the removal of forests.

7. What term describes the movement of material by rivers and the sea?

- A. Tombolo
- B. Throughflow
- C. Subsistence
- D. Transport**

Movement of material by rivers and the sea is transport. This term describes how sediment is carried by moving water, whether in rivers (as bedload along the bed, or as suspended load in the water column, or dissolved) or along coastlines (carried by waves and currents). Transport is the process that moves sediment away from erosion zones toward deposition areas. A tombolo is a landform created by deposition that connects an island to the mainland, so it's about a result of sediment movement rather than the movement itself. Throughflow is water moving through soil, not the transportation of sediment by rivers or seas. Subsistence here isn't describing sediment movement either; it refers to something else. So transport best describes the movement of material by rivers and the sea.

8. The wearing away of rock fragments as they rub against each other during transportation.

- A. Catchment Area

The idea here is how rocks wear down as they are moved. When rock fragments are transported by water, wind, or ice, they frequently collide and rub against each other. This mutual grinding wears the fragments down, making them smaller and more rounded. That process is called attrition. It's about the rocks wearing each other away, rather than being worn down by the bed or banks (abrasion) or by chemical dissolution. So the term that fits the description best is attrition. The other options don't describe this mechanical rubbing between transported fragments. Catchment area refers to the drainage basin feeding a river, continentality to climate effects from distance from the sea, and biodiversity to the variety of living organisms.

9. What is the name for a meander that has been cut off from the main river channel and abandoned?

- A. Ox Bow Lake**
- B. Slip Off Slope
- C. River Cliff
- D. Alluvium

When a bend in a river becomes cut off from the main channel, the feature that forms is an oxbow lake. This happens when one of the meander's necks is breached during a flood, allowing the river to take a shorter, straighter path. The river then follows the new course, leaving the old meander loop isolated from the main flow. Over time, sediment fills the abandoned channel and a crescent-shaped lake remains where the loop used to be. Why the other terms don't fit: a slip-off slope is the deposited ramp on the inside of a bend, still connected to the active meander; a river cliff is the steep outer bank eroded away on the outside of the bend; alluvium refers to general river-deposited sediment, not a water-filled abandoned loop.

10. The ease with which, in this case, a person is able to reach and use a service

- A. Reliability
- B. Availability
- C. Accessibility (services)**
- D. Affordability

This item focuses on accessibility of services—the ease with which people can reach and actually use them. It covers how close a service is, how easy it is to get there (transport, hours, and physical access), and how user-friendly the service is (including for people with disabilities or different needs). When a service is easy to reach and use, barriers are reduced and people can access it when they need it. That makes accessibility the best fit for the idea described. By comparison, availability means the service exists and can be used at some time; reliability is about consistent performance; affordability is about cost.
