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## **Explanations**

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**1. Which organization is dedicated to investigating wrongful convictions and exonerating the innocent?**

Focusing on the work of overturning wrongful convictions and securing exonerations, the organization in question is the Innocence Project. It is a nonprofit dedicated to re-examining cases where new evidence, especially DNA testing, can prove innocence. By providing legal representation, pursuing post-conviction relief, and advocating for systemic reforms, they work to correct miscarriages of justice and prevent future ones. The other options relate to different roles or concepts (a medical/legal procedure term, a crime scene investigator, or general public-interest factors) and don't specialize in exonerating the innocent.

Criminal behavior can be linked to stable personality traits, and the theorist who formalized a personality-based explanation is Eysenck. He proposed the PEN model, with three temperament dimensions: Extraversion, Neuroticism, and Psychoticism. People scoring high on these traits are thought to be more prone to crime because their temperament affects how they respond to socialization and conditioning and, combined with biological factors, can influence likelihoods of rule-breaking. This approach is distinct from Bandura's focus on learning through observation, and from XYY, which centers on a chromosomal idea rather than personality, or Jacobs, which isn't the well-known personality-crime theory here. So, Eysenck is the best fit for a personality theory related to crime.

If there isn't a realistic prospect of conviction, pursuing charges isn't justified because the case would likely fail. If the evidential test is passed, prosecutors then consider the public interest test to decide whether it is appropriate to prosecute, taking into account factors like seriousness, impact, and resource implications. The other options aren't about evidential sufficiency or are simply not tests for charging decisions (they refer to a court or a professional body). So the term that matches the evidential standard used to determine if a case should be prosecuted is the evidential test.

The broader Criminal Justice System includes courts and corrections as part of the process after enforcement, Investigation Techniques are methods used to gather evidence, and Social Control refers to the mechanisms that regulate behavior, not a single enforcing body. So the police best fit the described role of enforcing laws and maintaining order.

In this diploma, final grades are determined by total Uniform Marks (UMS) earned across all assessment components. Illegal actions by corporations for the purpose of profit are described as corporate crime. It's different from organized crime, which refers to criminal networks as entities; moral crime, which concerns breaches of moral norms; and human rights crime, which involves violations of fundamental rights often in political or state contexts. So the label that fits illegal, profit-driven actions by corporations is corporate crime.

The pattern of crime data over time is captured by crime statistics. This term covers how crime data are collected, organized, and analyzed to reveal trends, patterns, and changes across different periods. It lets us see whether crime is rising, falling, or fluctuating with seasons or years, and it supports comparisons over time and across places. Deviance is about behavior that violates norms, not data trends. A Local Authority is just an administrative body, not a description of data patterns. Incidence of crime refers to the number of new crimes occurring in a given period, which is a component you'd find within crime statistics, but the broader idea of patterns over time is described by crime statistics.

These are the legal rights that shield individuals as the investigation unfolds. The other options don't capture this idea. Trial processes refer to what happens in court, not during the police investigation. Key influences is too vague and not about protections. Use of evidence concerns how evidence is collected and used, which is about evidentiary rules rather than the rights of the person being investigated.
