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Explanations

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1. Which economic activity created the demand for skilled labor, especially in Asia and Silicon Valley?

High-tech manufacturing of computer chips drives a strong need for highly skilled workers. Creating and refining semiconductors involves complex engineering, precise design, rigorous testing, and advanced fabrication processes that must be carefully controlled in cleanroom environments. Teams of electrical and computer engineers, materials scientists, process engineers, technicians, and software specialists are needed to design chips, run and optimize production facilities, ensure quality, and push for new generations of small, faster, and more efficient circuits. That blend of advanced design and precision manufacturing is why Asia has become a major hub for chip production while Silicon Valley is a center for chip design and tech development, intensifying the demand for skilled labor. Other options don't fit as well because agriculture is labor-intensive but not focused on high-tech, climate zones are geographic features rather than an economic activity, and manufacturing spans many sectors but doesn't specifically capture the global emphasis on computer chips and the tied demand for specialized expertise.

A globe is a three-dimensional, to-scale model of the Earth. Because it is a sphere, it preserves the planet's shape and the relative sizes and distances of continents and oceans more accurately than a flat map, which must be projected and inevitably distorts some properties. A globe also helps you visualize latitude and longitude and how different places relate around the world. By contrast, a map is a flat representation that distorts areas or shapes due to projection, and satellite images or aerial photographs are actual pictures of the Earth's surface rather than a scaled model of the whole planet.

Think about how nations manage a place they all want to study without letting it become a battlefield. The Antarctica Treaty does that by design: it keeps the continent free from military use and focuses on science and cooperation. It was signed in 1959 and came into force in 1961, by countries actively involved in Antarctic research. The core idea is to demilitarize the region and make it a shared field for peaceful scientific investigation, with data and discoveries exchanged freely. It also helps prevent new territorial claims from becoming the basis for conflict, and it limits military activity to peaceful support for research. It isn't about mining or exploiting resources, nor is it a security pact to defend Antarctica, and it doesn't aim to establish year-round settlements. Those aspects are not in line with what the treaty envisions. So the best description is that the treaty, signed in 1959, demilitarizes the continent so it can be used as a haven for scientific study.

The key idea is a water route that made inland goods easy to move all the way to a major Atlantic port. The Erie Canal did exactly that by linking the Great Lakes to the Hudson River, opening a direct, cheaper path to New York City. Once completed, ships could transport farm produce and manufactured goods from the interior to NYC and then onto international markets, helping the city become a leading center of trade and growth. The other options don't fit this combination: the Suez and Panama Canals connect different oceans but not the Great Lakes, and the St. Lawrence Seaway does connect the Great Lakes to the Atlantic but it came later and is less tied to NYC's early growth.

Language distribution is shown most clearly on a language map, which uses colors or patterns to mark where different languages are spoken. This makes it easy to see regional language boundaries, multilingual areas, and how languages cluster or spread across regions. Climate maps depict weather patterns, physical maps emphasize landforms, and ethnicity maps show where different ethnic groups live—areas that may overlap with language use but don't directly illustrate language distribution. So a language map is the best choice for showing where language is spoken.

How geography and location shape a city's role in global trade. A major maritime trade hub sits at a strategic sea lane, with deep, well-connected ports and access to busy shipping networks. Singapore fits this because it's a city-state on an island near the Strait of Malacca, right at a crossroads of global shipping routes, and it hosts the Port of Singapore, one of the world's busiest container ports. Its island geography—with multiple surrounding islands and extensive port facilities—supports large-scale, efficient maritime commerce. The other places don't align as closely: Cape Town is a major port but not defined by island geography, while Omaha is inland and Samarkand is landlocked, far from major sea lanes.

Understanding map types helps you see what each map emphasizes. A political map is designed to show human-made boundaries—between states, provinces, and countries—and it commonly marks capital cities and other major urban centers. That combination of borders and key cities is exactly what this question describes, making it the best fit. Climate maps focus on climate zones, such as temperature and precipitation patterns, and usually don't highlight political borders or capitals. Precipitation maps show rainfall amounts and are even more specialized, so they don't emphasize borders or cities either. A general map could portray many things, but it isn't specifically about political boundaries and major cities like capitals.

NAFTA is a trilateral agreement designed to lower trade barriers across North America. It brings Canada, the United States, and Mexico into a single framework, so that tariffs, import quotas, and other restrictions are reduced among all three countries. This setup makes it easier to buy and sell goods and services across their borders and encourages cross-border investment. So the best choice is the group that includes all three nations—Canada, the United States, and Mexico—not just any two-country pairing. The other options describe bilateral arrangements, which NAFTA does not represent.

The region in the central United States is where warm, moist air from the Gulf of Mexico meets cool, dry air from the north, and the jet stream aloft winds overhead. That clash creates powerful, rotating thunderstorms that can develop into tornadoes. The flat, open plains let these storms organize and persist, especially in spring, producing frequent tornado outbreaks. Other areas don't typically experience this same combination of air masses, wind shear, and storm organization: Southeast Asia is dominated by tropical systems, Northern Europe has a cooler, maritime climate with less frequent convective storms, and Sub-Saharan Africa's weather patterns don't regularly support the same high-frequency tornado activity.

The Primary Sector is the part of the economy that involves taking resources directly from the natural environment. It includes activities like farming and agriculture, mining, forestry, and fishing—basically gathering raw materials rather than processing them. That's why this option fits best: it describes gathering natural resources and raw materials. In contrast, manufacturing or assembly belongs to the secondary sector, which turns raw materials into finished goods. Service industries—the tertiary sector—provide tasks and experiences like healthcare, education, retail, and finance. Trading and finance are services, typically classified with the tertiary (and sometimes quaternary) sector, not extraction.
