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Explanations

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1. Which city was a major Renaissance trade hub along with Florence and Genoa?

Venice rose as a major Renaissance trade hub because its strategic position on the Adriatic and Mediterranean made it the gateway between Europe and the East. Its merchants controlled sea routes, traded spices, silk, and other luxury goods, and built vast wealth that funded art, learning, and the spread of new ideas. This maritime wealth complemented Florence's inland banking strength and Genoa's own trading network, creating a trio of powerful commercial centers that propelled the Renaissance. While Milan relied more on inland commerce and political power, and Naples and Pisa played important roles in different periods, Venice stands out as the quintessential maritime hub alongside Florence and Genoa.

Jerusalem is sacred in Islam but is not on the Arabian Peninsula, while Damascus and Cairo are important historic centers in the Muslim world but do not hold the same foundational significance for the faith as Mecca and Medina.

In short, Pax Romana is best understood as a period where peace and prosperity facilitated trade, cultural exchange, and consolidation of imperial power. The other descriptions don't fit because they describe ongoing warfare, limited trade despite conquest, or religious upheaval, none of which characterize this era.

Because of this, Muhammad is regarded as the founder of Islam—the central figure responsible for transmitting the faith and founding its community. Jesus is a central figure in Christianity and is honored as a prophet in Islam, but he did not establish Islam. Buddha founded Buddhism, and Moses is a foundational figure in Judaism and a prophet in Islam, but he did not establish Islam.

Writing also preserves literature and official records for future generations, reinforcing culture and governance. It isn't accurate to say it dominated science or invented the telescope, nor to claim it had little influence or was entirely isolated from political power.
