1. Which artwork shows a steam train passing through a coastal setting?

- A. Steve McCurry - Train Station, Agra (1983)

Recognize a scene that pairs a steam locomotive with a coastal landscape. Yoshitoshi's *Railroad at Takanawa*, a woodblock print from 1871, shows a steam train moving along a coastal route near Takanawa, with the sea and ships visible in the background. That combination of a steam engine and seaside setting matches the description exactly. The other options don't fit: a photo of a train station in Agra is urban and inland, a contemporary sculpture isn't a train scene, and Kant on beauty is a philosophical text image rather than a depiction of a train by the coast.

2. Which term describes travel that emphasizes tasting regional cuisine and eating local specialties?

- A. Agritourism
- B. Edutourism
- C. Gastrotourism**
- D. Dark tourism

Gastrotourism is travel designed around savoring regional cuisine and local specialties. It centers the trip on authentic food experiences—tasting signature dishes, exploring markets, taking cooking classes, and sampling local beverages to understand a place's culture through its flavors. This term captures the idea that food is the main guide of the journey, not just a backdrop. Agritourism focuses more on rural life and farming activities rather than just tasting food. Edutourism emphasizes learning experiences on the go, and dark tourism involves visiting sites tied to tragedy or death.

3. Which statement best describes convergent infinite series as used in the discussion?

- A. Infinitely many terms always sum to infinity.
- B. Infinitely many terms can sum to a finite limit.**

The idea being tested is whether adding up infinitely many terms can settle to a finite total. You look at the partial sums $S_n = a_1 + a_2 + \dots + a_n$ and ask if, as n grows larger, S_n approaches some finite value. If it does, the series is convergent and the infinite sum equals that limit. A classic example is $1/2 + 1/4 + 1/8 + \dots$, whose partial sums get closer and closer to 1. This shows that infinitely many terms can indeed sum to a finite limit. The other statements don't fit because a convergent series does not blow up to infinity; it has a finite sum. And while not every infinite series has an easily found closed form, its sum can still be defined as the finite limit of the partial sums. Infinite series are also used in practice precisely because many converge to useful finite values.

4. Which term means the relationships where one task must finish before another starts?

In scheduling, when one task must finish before another can start, that relationship is called a dependency. It creates an order: the first task completes, then the second can begin. This is specifically the finish-to-start type of dependency, which is the typical way we model prerequisites in a plan and helps determine the project timeline and the critical path. The other terms don't describe this linking rule—the schedule itself is a harmonogram, the Waterfall method is a project process model, and the Stakhanovite Movement is unrelated historically.

5. Which term ranks passports by the number of destinations that can be visited without a visa?

The concept being tested is how travel freedom associated with a passport is measured. This term specifically captures how many destinations a passport holder can enter without needing to obtain a visa in advance, often counting visa-free or visa-on-arrival access across many countries. A Passport Index ranks passports by that mobility metric, reflecting how powerful a passport is for international travel. The other terms refer to different ideas: GDP measures the size of an economy, the Gini coefficient gauges income inequality, and the HDI combines health, education, and income to assess development. So, the term that best describes ranking passports by the number of visa-free destinations is Passport Index.

6. Which term describes the long-standing hope of reducing war through diplomacy and international cooperation?

Reducing war through diplomacy and international cooperation is best described as a global peace goal—the worldwide aim to achieve and maintain peace by negotiation, treaties, and shared international institutions. This phrasing captures the long-standing effort to prevent conflict by working together across nations, rather than relying on force. Liberal democracy refers to a form of government based on free elections, civil liberties, and the rule of law, which is related to governance but not the specific international peace objective. The other two options are unrelated topics, so they don't fit the concept of pursuing peace through diplomacy and cooperation.

7. Which work was authored by Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve?

- A. In Mrs. Tilscher's Class
- B. The Medicine Bag**

Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve is known for stories about Native American life and family traditions, often focusing on intergenerational lessons and cultural heritage. The Medicine Bag is a short story she wrote that follows a boy who learns about his Lakota roots when he spends time with his grandmother and discovers the meaning of a medicine bag handed down through generations. The story uses a simple, intimate moment to explore identity, memory, and respect for elders—themes Sneve frequently brings to her work. The other titles listed are by different authors and do not reflect Sneve's writing style or subjects, so they aren't the works she authored.

8. The Eisenhower Method is named after which historical figure?

- A. Dwight D. Eisenhower**
- B. Martin Luther King Jr.

This question tests your knowledge of who the Eisenhower Method is named after. The name comes from Dwight D. Eisenhower, the U.S. general in World War II and later the president, who was known for a disciplined approach to deciding what to tackle first. The method, often called the Eisenhower Matrix, helps you prioritize by urgency and importance, sorting tasks into four categories to decide what to do now, what to schedule, what to delegate, and what to drop. The other figures listed are famous for different contributions, not for a time-management framework named after them. So the person the method is named after is Dwight D. Eisenhower.

9. What navigation method uses direction and distance cues to move toward a target?

- A. Dead reckoning
- B. Desire paths
- C. Braess's Paradox
- D. Vector based navigation**

The idea being tested is guiding movement toward a goal by using a direct vector toward the target. When you think in terms of a vector, you take the straight-line direction to the goal and the distance remaining, and you move along that single bearing until you reach the target. This approach yields a direct path because the path is defined by the vector from your current position to the goal. Dead reckoning works differently: it involves updating your own position by accumulating direction and distance traveled from a known starting point, mainly to know where you are, not necessarily to aim at a specific target. Desire paths are informal, habitual routes people or animals take, not a formal method for navigating toward a goal. Braess's Paradox is a network phenomenon about how adding capacity can affect travel times, not a navigation method.

10. Which term refers to unwillingness to change existing processes even when new methods would improve efficiency?

- A. Emotional investment
- B. Status quo bias**
- C. Sunk cost fallacy

Status quo bias is the tendency to prefer things stay the same and to resist changing existing processes, even when a new method would be more efficient. This happens because the current way feels familiar and safer, so people overestimate the risks of change and underestimate the potential gains. In practice, you might keep a slower, manual workflow because learning a new automated process seems daunting, even though the new method could save time and effort overall. Sunk cost fallacy, by contrast, is about continuing with a path because you've already invested resources in it. Commitment bias is about sticking with a chosen plan to appear consistent. Emotional investment is about attachment to particular outcomes. These describe different reasons for sticking with or resisting changes, but they don't specifically capture the pull to keep things exactly as they are just because they're the current state—status quo bias does.
