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Explanations

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1. Which term describes the policy in which a powerful nation seeks to dominate others politically, socially, and economically?

Imperialism is the policy where a powerful nation seeks to extend its control over other lands and peoples, politically, economically, and socially. It goes beyond military might to involve influencing or ruling other governments, extracting resources and shaping economies, and spreading the dominant culture or institutions. This multi-dimensional control is what the description aiming to dominate others on political, social, and economic levels refers to. Militarism focuses on building and using military force, rather than directly controlling other societies across multiple dimensions. Alliances are agreements between states for cooperation or mutual defense, not a strategy of domination. Nationalism is pride in one's own nation, which can fuel expansion, but it isn't itself the policy of controlling other nations across political, economic, and social spheres.

Appeasement is the idea of giving in to some demands to avoid war. The Munich Conference of 1938 brought Britain, France, Italy, and Germany together to decide the fate of the Sudetenland, a region of Czechoslovakia with many ethnic Germans. They ceded it to Germany in exchange for Hitler's promise to stop expanding, a move meant to prevent a broader conflict. This is why the event is associated with appeasement. Yet the plan backfired, as Hitler soon took the rest of Czechoslovakia and then Poland, showing that conceding territory only encouraged further aggression. The other conferences happened in different times and contexts: Tehran was a wartime meeting, Potsdam dealt with postwar order, and Versailles was the post-World War I treaty. Munich is the one that fits the description.

Why the other options don't fit: democracy involves competitive elections and multiple political parties, along with protections for private property and individual rights. capitalism centers on private property and market-driven economics, not state ownership. federalism refers to how power is divided between national and regional governments, not to one-party rule or the abolition of private property. So the described system is best described as a Communist dictatorship.

Appeasement is the approach Churchill argued against. In the late 1930s, many European leaders tried to avoid war by giving in to Hitler's demands, hoping concessions would satisfy him and keep the peace. The Munich Agreement of 1938, for example, allowed Germany to take the Sudetenland from Czechoslovakia to prevent a larger conflict. Churchill believed this would only embolden Hitler, rewarding aggression and leaving Britain and its allies more vulnerable when war inevitably came. He argued for strengthening Britain's defenses, rearming, and forming strong alliances to deter aggression rather than placating it. Containment reflects a later Cold War strategy to stop the spread of a rival power, not the prewar situation Churchill was reacting to. Isolationism means staying out of foreign conflicts, which Churchill did not advocate; he pushed for engagement and preparedness. Militarism is about expanding military power, something Churchill supported to counter threats, but the specific policy he opposed in this context was appeasement.

Asylum policies balance national security concerns with human rights obligations by combining safe, orderly processing with fair, rights-respecting procedures. This means processing claims securely and efficiently, conducting careful vetting to identify legitimate asylum cases while also screening for genuine security risks, and ensuring protections for fundamental rights throughout the process—such as access to information in a understandable language, legal representation when possible, and fair hearings. International law guides this balance, reinforcing duties like not returning people to danger (non-refoulement) and upholding the right to seek asylum. There's ongoing debate about how to reconcile deterrence and border control with humanitarian obligations—some argue for stricter measures to deter abuse, while others emphasize timely, fair protections for those in genuine need. Choices that push for no rights protections, no vetting, or automatic blanket denial underestimate or disregard these obligations and practical security needs. This approach—safe processing, careful vetting, and rights protection—best reflects how asylum policy attempts to balance security with human rights.

Global health initiatives influence development by strengthening population health, which is a foundation for economic and social progress. When life expectancy rises and the burden of disease drops, people are healthier and miss fewer work or school days. This healthier, more capable workforce and student population drives higher productivity, learning, and long-term economic growth. Vaccination programs prevent outbreaks, reduce healthcare costs, and protect families from catastrophic medical expenses, freeing resources for investment in education, housing, and entrepreneurship. Strong health systems also bolster trust in institutions and support better governance, which helps sustain development over time. Raising military spending diverts scarce resources away from health and development aims. Reducing access to vaccines directly undermines health gains and development progress. Limiting governance and accountability weakens the institutions that enable sustained growth.

The main job of the United Nations Security Council is to maintain international peace and security. Its actions are binding on UN member states, which highlights how central its role is to global security. This focus sets it apart from promoting cultural exchange (handled by agencies focused on culture), regulating international trade (primarily managed by trade and economic bodies), or simply providing humanitarian aid (carried out by humanitarian organizations and programs).

The Berlin Wall is the barrier built in 1961 that separated East and West Berlin and became a stark symbol of repression during the Cold War. This physical division underscored the broader East–West split and the restriction of freedom that characterized the era. By comparison, the Great Wall is an ancient Chinese fortification, the Maginot Line was French border fortifications, and the Iron Curtain describes the ideological dividing line between East and West Europe rather than a physical barrier. The Berlin Wall stood as a concrete, ongoing reminder of repression until its fall in 1989.

After World War II, the empire system weakened and nationalist movements pushed for self-rule, leading to a rapid wave of independence across continents. This period saw many colonies breaking free and then trying to position themselves in a bipolar world, with some joining blocs or pursuing non-aligned paths. The result wasn't just sovereignty for new states; it reshaped global politics as the Cold War rivalry influenced how these nations chose their relationships, aid, and trade. That's why this option is the best: decolonization did accelerate, bringing independence to numerous colonies, and the newly independent countries often sought new political alignments within the evolving Cold War order. The other statements don't fit because decolonization did not slow down or stay confined to a few regions, and colonial powers did not reassert control in most places.
