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## **Explanations**

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1. Which statement accurately describes the district court's role in appeals?

- A. It handles only original trials.
- B. It handles all appeals from inferior courts as provided by law.**

The district court's role in appeals is to review decisions from inferior courts as provided by law. This means its appellate power comes from statutes that specify which lower-court decisions it can hear and how those reviews are conducted. That description fits best because it acknowledges that the district court isn't limited to original trials only; it also serves as an appellate venue for lower court rulings, within the framework set by law. It doesn't handle appeals from the Supreme Court, since the Supreme Court is the state's highest court and doesn't appeal to the district court. It also doesn't hear appeals from federal courts, which follow the federal appellate system rather than state-level district court review.

This protection ensures community participation in the justice system and helps prevent governmental overreach. A jury trial isn't optional in typical criminal cases; a bench trial would only occur if the defendant voluntarily waives the right to a jury. The legislative branch, by contrast, is the lawmaker—it creates and passes laws. The judiciary interprets those laws and settles disputes about their meaning or application. Because enforcement involves administering and applying laws through agencies and police powers, it belongs to the executive. Saying all branches enforce laws isn't accurate, since the other branches have distinct roles focused on making and interpreting laws.

After two-thirds of both chambers approve a constitutional amendment, it goes to the people for a vote in the next regular election. A simple majority of voters who cast ballots on the measure is enough to approve it, and then it becomes part of the Wyoming Constitution. The governor doesn't automatically approve amendments, federal approval isn't needed, and there isn't a requirement for unanimous legislative consent or a special-session action. The final say rests with the voters in the general election.

Knowing where Wyoming's major state institutions are located helps you answer this. The Capitol sits in Cheyenne, the University of Wyoming is in Laramie, and the Wyoming State Hospital is in Evanston. The state penitentiary is in Rawlins, so the institution located there is the Penitentiary.

Wyoming's Legislature meets in the State Capitol Building in Cheyenne. This building serves as the seat of the state government, housing both legislative chambers and the main offices where sessions are held. The University of Wyoming campus in Laramie is a university, not a legislative meeting place. City Hall in Cheyenne is the center of municipal government, not state government. The old Territorial Capitol is a historic site and not used for current sessions. So the State Capitol Building in Cheyenne is the correct location.

If both chambers achieve those votes, the bill becomes law despite the veto; if they don't, the veto stands and the bill dies. This setup ensures the executive can check legislation while giving the Legislature a strong check if there's broad cross-chamber support to enact the measure anyway. The other options aren't correct because the Governor does have veto power, vetoes can stop a bill unless overridden, and the Lieutenant Governor does not hold veto power.

Public education funding is the focus here. The Permanent School Fund is set up specifically to benefit public schools in Wyoming, and its earnings are distributed to school districts to support their operations and budgets. By directing the income to school districts, the state ensures that funds intended for education reach the local schools that serve students every day.

This combination ensures public education stays secular and not aligned with or promoting any religious belief. Secret balloting protects voters from outside pressure, ensures their choices remain confidential, and upholds the integrity of the process. The other ideas clash with these fundamentals. Balloting in public view and counting aloud would expose votes, undermining secrecy. Printing ballots in more than one language isn't what this item focuses on, even though accessibility matters. Using a separate ballot for each candidate would create unnecessary fragmentation and complicate the voting process, rather than presenting all options together on one ballot.
