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Explanations

Using the wrong shotshell in your shotgun can lead to severe safety hazards, including the risk of an explosion. This contrasts with the other choices, which limit the scope of management to just one category of wildlife or imply that only federal agencies are responsible, overlooking the important role that state agencies play in the management of both game and nongame wildlife.
